The Archaeological Society of South Carolina is excited to announce that the theme for this year's conference will be:

Women in South Carolina Archaeology

This year, the 49th annual conference will honor the legacies and ongoing contributions of the many women who have shaped South Carolina archaeology. Presentations will highlight the past and present experiences of women in archaeology, the contributions of women to notable archaeological projects, current research exploring gender, sex, and sexuality in the archaeological record, and memorials of pioneering women in archaeology who are no longer with us.

2023 marks the 48th anniversary of the first woman-authored CRM report filed in South Carolina, written by Susan Jackson at the South Carolina Institute of Archaeology & Anthropology in 1976. Since then, women have contributed greatly to every aspect of archaeology in South Carolina. Educational and professional institutions in South Carolina, led by preeminent, award-winning women, have produced increasing rates of exceptional women archaeologists who are now part of the growing majority of professional women working in archaeology across the Southeast.

In the spirit of highlighting the diverse experiences of women in archaeology, this year's conference will feature a panel of significant women in South Carolina archaeology who will bring a wide range of perspectives and experiences to the topic.

Symposium on the Search for Stuarts Town Project
USC Beaufort Center for the Arts Auditorium, Beaufort, SC
February 4th, 1:00 pm to 4:00 pm

Archaeologists from the Search for Stuarts Town, the project to look for evidence of the lost Scottish colony, will hold a free public symposium to

discuss the projects' findings.

In August of 2022, a team of archaeologists from the University of South Carolina's Institute of Archaeology and Anthropology (SCIAA) and the University of Florida spent a week doing an exploratory dig in The Point neighborhood of Beaufort – searching for the lost 17th century Scottish colony of Stuarts Town. The symposium

will be the first public presentation of what was found, what it may (or may not) mean, and future plans for The Search for Stuarts Town project.

Camden Battlefield Reinterment Ceremony Camden Battlefield, Camden, SC

April 22nd

In November, the South Carolina Battleground Preservation Trust announced the discovery of the remains of fourteen Revolutionary War soldiers at who were killed in the 1780 Battle of Camden. A team of SCIAA and SCDNR archaeologists, along with biological anthropologists from the Richland County Coroner's Office and the University of South Carolina,

unearthed the skeletal remains and accompanying artifacts of these soldiers.

Their remains were carefully excavated and removed over a period of several weeks so that they could be studied by forensic anthropologists at the Richland County Coroner's Office. This is a rare opportunity to learn about the personal stories of the individuals who fought in the Revolutionary War: their age, health, race, and even where they were born.



Once this project has concluded, the fourteen soldiers will be returned to rest at the Camden Battlefield in a respectful reinterment ceremony with full honors. Join the SC Battleground Preservation Trust in honoring the contributions of these individuals, both in their time and in ours. 

In Memoriam

The South Carolina archaeological community has lost several valued members in recent months. The ASSC mourns the loss of these wonderful members of the community and expresses sincere condolences to their loved ones.

Roger John Lindsay

Mr. Roger John Lindsay of Pickens, South Carolina passed away in late 2022 at the age of 82. Throughout his life, he developed a deep knowledge and understanding of local primitive technology. He used his flintknapping skills to create detailed replicas of archaeological projectile points, and his knowledge and experiments made him a valuable member and friend to the South Carolina archaeological community.

ASSC Archivist Christopher Judge of the USC Lancaster Native American Studies Center writes in remembrance of Mr. Lindsay:

"As a member of the archaeological community in South Carolina I was saddened to learn of the passing of Roger. He was a delightful soul who shared his knowledge and sense of humor with us. He knew more about the atlatl spearthrower than any of us and his experiments inspired us in so many ways. A knowledgeable collector of Catawba pottery, he was a friend to the Native American communities in SC as well. Lastly, he was one of nicest people I have ever met in this life. Deepest condolences to his family, friends and community."

Fred Henry Shute

Christopher Judge shares Mr. Fred Henry Shute's involvement and impact on the Lancaster archaeological community:

"Henry Shute was the first person to volunteer in the archaeology lab in the newly opened Native American Studies Center in 2013. He brought some of his artifacts to our "PreAntiques Road Show." After I looked at his artifacts and moved to the next person in line, Henry pulled up a chair and joined me in looking at everyone's artifacts who came that day.

Soon afterward, he began volunteering in the archaeology lab each Thursday, my first volunteer, from that point until his illness no longer allowed his attendance. Henry would often demonstrate how to make arrowheads for my archaeology classes and was a mentor in various prehistoric technologies to a young teenaged lab volunteer Jake.

Eventually, Henry began to tell me about diving on an Indian mound under the lake. I had always wanted to know more about this mound. Henry donated many of his artifacts to the NASC and furthered our knowledge about this site and other similar sites I had been working on in the region.


In 2014, the Archaeological Society of South Carolina bestowed the "Archaeologist of the Year Award" to Henry for his many efforts to support South Carolina archaeology and archaeologists.

Henry's wife Carol, who later became a regular in the archaeology lab, established a fund now known as the Fred "Henry" Shute Archaeology Lab Endowment to support the efforts of the USC Lancaster's NASC Archaeology lab. This wonderful gift will allow Henry's memory to live on in perpetuity here in Lancaster."

Drucilla K. Barker, PhD

Dr. Drucilla Barker was a professor of Anthropology and Women's and Gender Studies at the University of South Carolina from 2007 until her recent passing in January of this year. Her work as an anthropologist was interdisciplinary and wide-reaching, exploring the roles of gender, race, class, and other social factors in the modern global economy. She published several books on the subject, and she is recognized as an accomplished scholar in the fields of anthropology, economics, and feminist studies.

Although she was not an archaeologist, Dr. Barker was a teacher and mentor to many members of the South Carolina archaeological community. From undergraduate anthropology courses to PhD dissertation committees, Dr. Barker contributed to the education and training of many South Carolina archaeologists. Her presence and expertise will be missed both at UofSC and in our wider community.
