Member-at-Large (2): Members-at-large serve on the executive board and its committees, and assist with the general business and activities of the Society.


# Thank You!

# Don Rosick Graduate Student Grant-in-Aid Fund

The ASSC sponsors the Don Rosick Graduate Student Grant-in-Aid fund to provide financial assistance to graduate students conducting research on South Carolina archaeology. Grant-in-Aid funding is awarded to graduate students at both in-state and out-of-state institutions whose theses or dissertations pertain to the archaeology of South Carolina. Awards of up to \$1,000 dollars are available to graduate students on a competitive basis.

### Grant-in-Aid Recipient

Congratulations to the most recent recipient of Grant-in-Aid funding:

Nina Schreiner is a PhD candidate at the University of South Carolina and NAGPRA Coordinator at the SC Institute of Archaeology and Anthropology, as well as a member of the ASSC executive board. Her dissertation documents nineteenth century legacy collections and theorizes the role of archaeological materials in settler colonial domestic space. The Grant-in-Aid award will fund collection of archival and



material attribute data on objects at Woodville, a historic house museum in Southwestern Pennsylvania. Nineteenth century residents of Woodville amassed a large collection of Native American artifacts from the Middle Atlantic and Southeast U.S., including the Carolinas and Georgia. Materials from the Southeast were collected by members of one family during railroad construction projects from 1850 to 1900 and displayed in a museum-style exhibit in their Pennsylvania home. We look forward to hearing more about Nina's research!
