Saturday, October 26th 12,000 Year History Park, Cayce, SC



The 38KE12 archaeological site in the Wateree River Valley of South Carolina consists of a Native American multi-mound complex, potentially representing the town of Cofitachequi or Talimeco. Through collaboration with Indigenous groups, a zooarchaeological documentation project of animal remains from site 38KE12 explores the roles of animals in relation to site inhabitants. The symbolic significance of animals reveals potential ritual feasting activities that occurred at the site during its occupation from ca. AD 1225-1562.

Midlands Chapter Update - A 3 Hour Tour

The Midlands Chapter went for an adventure in the woods for our August meeting. We had heard of an old chimney approximately 100 yards from where ASSC holds Fall Field Day every year. It was supposed to be just inside the woods, however it took us around an hour to locate it. The woods are dense and crisscrossed with deep creeks and streams and alligators are often spotted nearby. Based on the information we had, the chimney was not on either of the two documented sites in the area. In fact, it lies between the two site boundaries. Six members of our Chapter joined us for this adventure. Once we reach the chimney, we realized it was not as old as we assumed it would be. We set out photographing and documenting the surrounding area. The chimney's fire box was approximately five feet off the ground and was lined with an asphalt shingle-like material. It was evident that the rest house had been demolished and the remains, including piers, corrugated metal, electrical boxes and cast iron plumbing had been pushed into a pile on the edge of the drainage ditch. We also noted a wooden power pole, insulators, electrical outlets and concrete blocks. Based on their appearance it is likely the bricks used in the construction of the piers and chimney were reclaimed from an older structure. While the bricks were likely historic, the piers also incorporated early twentieth century concrete blocks. It turns out this chimney likely belonged to a house built some time in the mid-twentieth century. While not the anticipated find, we all had a good walk through the woods.

About the Chapter

The Midlands Chapter is the newest chapter of the Archaeological Society of South Carolina. It was launched in 2022 with the mission to further connect the archaeological community in the Midlands region.
